

Bryan Prince is an award-winning author of four books: I Came As A Stranger: The Underground Railroad (Tundra Books, 2004); A Shadow On The Household (McClelland & Stewart, 2009); One More River to Cross (Dundurn Press, 2012) and My Brother's Keeper: African Canadians and the American Civil War (Dundurn Press, 2015). He co-wrote the script for the television documentary A Thousand Miles to Freedom; is a co-producer of the concert series Road to Freedom; Canadian newsletter columnist for the Chicago based Center for Black Genealogy; a consulting editor with England's digital project Slavery, Abolition and Social Justice and was a historical consultant on the PBS/Rogers film The William Still Story. He has contributed to many other publications including: Something to Hope For: The Story Of The Fugitive Slave Settlement Buxton, Canada West (Chamberlain Mercury Printing, 1999); The Transatlantic Slave Trade and Slavery: New Directions in Teaching and Learning (Africa World Press, 2012) and A Fluid Frontier: Slavery, Resistance, and the Underground Railroad in the Detroit River
